The WBYC Summer

Series in now completed and though our overall numbers of boats were down from previous years the same number of boats sailed the qualifying number of races as did last year. To me that means that we ran a series that kept people coming back every week. The racing was quite close all season right to the end. In the last race of the series in the non-spinnaker class "Climax" finished first on corrected time ahead of "Escape Plan" by 9 seconds and when I first calculated the results "Warlord" and "Thora" were in a flat-footed tie for fourth place. After extending the calculations out a couple decimal places "Warlord" claimed fourth by .442 seconds. Third place for the season wasn't decided between "Mighty Moose" and "Obadiah" until the final race of the year. "Moose" loved the +15 knots of breeze and the long beat in the final race to come out ahead of "Obadiah." The series final standings for the first three boats were:

The rescheduled Rainone Solo/Twin Regatta was sailed in a solid breeze with 4 double-handed entries and three single-handed entries. After talking "trash" for weeks bragging rights for the next year were claimed by the old guy (it's his birthday today as I write this) in the Stocker/Mojo/Challenge but they were both beaten by a boat from across the bay, "Two Dogs" sailed by Moose McClintock. Though "Estesea" got the gun in the double-handed class she was beaten on corrected time by "Spitfire."

The scheduled date of the Fantastic Plastic proved to be a day of no wind (and rain), so rather than sending boats out to sit we postponed the race before leaving the comfort of the clubhouse. Those who responded correctly to the hoisting of the "Come Within Hail" flag on the front of the club joined a great, indoor lunch gathering. The race has been rescheduled for Saturday, September 8th.

We've had a year of an unreliable seabreeze and it was very patchy for the Lady Skippers Regatta. The start was postponed 55 minutes) to wait for the wind to fill in (and in part for "Climax" to arrive) and while we did manage to get the race started we had to shorten the course and finish boats way down at the R"2" Bell northeast of Connanicut Point. We had a good turnout of 7 boats racing in a non-spinnaker class. Lisa Primavera on "Spitfire" finished first, 42 seconds (on corrected time) ahead of Kerri Bamford sailing "Cloud 8."

The fall series starts on Wednesday, September 5th. The format Grant Brandon started last year gave us a quick, intense, 4-race series and we hope to duplicate it again this year. So far, the entries received indicate that we will. Many EGYC boats join us for this series, as they don't run a fall series.

Women are showing how sailing is not just a sport by riding higher waves and exploring newer horizons

Say 'women' and 'sailing' and the first picture that comes to your mind is of a bikini clad girl sunbathing on an exquisite white yacht cutting through the turquoise blue water under a clear blue sky. It does make a fascinating sight, but is it really the complete picture of the world of sailing? Professional sailing has long been considered a man's domain, but women are breaking the barriers here as well.

Beauties and boats are no more restricted to glossy Kingfisher calendars and glamorous movies only.

In the real world, they are sweating it out in the sea, testing their skills at sailing. Shakeel Kudrolli, Founder and Managing Director, Aquasail, says, 'Women today are sporty and taking up sailing as a voluntary activity. They are learning to sail on their own and even enrolling for expensive courses so that they can single-handedly take on the adventure, sail in the ocean and come back-all on their own.' In the real world, they are sweating it out in the sea, testing their skills at sailing. Shakeel Kudrolli, Founder and Managing Director, Aquasail, says, 'Women today are sporty and taking up sailing as a voluntary activity. They are learning to sail on their own and even enrolling for expensive courses so that they can single-handedly take on the adventure, sail in the ocean and come back-all on their own.'

GOING WITH THE WIND

Nita Ambani, Parmeshwar Godrej and Avanti Birla are a few big names known for their love for yachts and sailing. However, women who sail are far more numerous than you might think - and the numbers are only rising. While many own yachts, some sail solo, some along the coast and others are sailing around the world.'A lot of women entrepreneurs, bank heads and corporate honchos are investing in boats for leisure and pleasure. They are working full time but still have a passion for sailing. They go out on weekends and explore the waters with friends and family,' says Anju Dutta, Managing Director, Marine Solutions. The lifestyle of sailors has largely been seen as an adventurous one. Besides the exhilarating experience that sailing offers, the ecstasy of the sea and the bliss of unadulterated wind are two major crowd pullers. Also, a range of opportunities and encouragement have now paved the way for more women to explore the sport like never before. In fact, when it comes to buying a boat, women today are playing a big part.'They always give opinion on the boat's configuration, size as well as the number of bedrooms and interiors, among other fancy things. For them it's like buying a house and they should be absolutely sure about it,' informs Zia Hazeebhoy, Director at Aquasail.

WINNING ACCOLADES

ONE of the biggest names in India's sailing industry is Rohini Rau, a doctor by profession, a pianist by hobby and a theatre actor. With a total of 14 National Gold medals, 5 National Silver medals and 2 Asian Gold medals, she has represented India in numerous International events including 8 World Championships.

Another young lady who has made it big in professional sailing is Ayesha Lobo, who started sailing at the age of 10 and has her own women's sailing team today. While these women are winning laurels for the country at international events, a large number of women in India get out into the sea because of their pure love for sailing. 'At Aquasail, we have ladies of all ages coming to learn sailing. While 50 per cent of kids are girls, almost 25 per cent of our students are women, including young entrepreneurs, homemakers, and even elderly, informs Zia. The world of leisure sailing is huge. 'While five percent of women in sailing indulge in the sport competitively, about 95 per cent enjoy it as a leisure sport,' adds Shakeel.

ALL ABOUT THE SKILL

A legendary name in the world of sailing, Britain's Ellen MacArthur started her career as a solo sailor at the age of 18, before breaking the world record in 'Round the World Ocean Race' in 2005. Another achiever is Mary Harper who sailed solo 1700 nautical miles across the Atlantic Ocean when she was 79, and continued to sail independently. Undoubtedly, for her, age was no barrier and neither was strength. A spirit of adventure is definitely required, and many are inspiration for others who dream of sailing solo.'If you see the history of sailing, it was not competitive initially. Even in the biggest of races, men and women used to participate together,' says Shakeel. When it comes to skills, Shakeel and Zia say in unison, 'Genetically men are made to be stronger, but when in the sea, it's the skill, and not just physical strength that matters.' And this is why, irrespective of gender and age, the sport appeals to all.

GET IT RIGHT


With today's modern technology - GPS, radios, satphones - sailing is much easier than it used to be. However, it is always good to enroll for a proper sailing course to learn the right techniques. Before plunging into the sea you must always do a full certified course to learn the basics of sailing. Once you are done with the certification, you are all good to go out and explore the sea,' says Anju. Learning to sail should also involve dealing with an emergencies that come with sailing, for which many courses are available. Besides the certification and skills, one must be aware of the boat (shapes, sizes and features); especially those who are planning to invest in it. Buying your own boat is no different than buying a car-you do your homework and establish your requirements. Just like any other purchase, one has to either pay in full or by financing your yacht purchase, which too is possible in India. Purchasing of the yatch entirely depends upon the usage and the customer's needs,' says Anju. According to her, the ideal boat for women is a Jeanneau 30 with a small cabin below and a comfortable table. It is sleek, stylish and very easy to control. Another boat that she strongly recommends is a 'Catamaran' as this beauty offers double the space (with two cabins) in the same length.

IT'S SHEER JOY

In western countries, buying a boat is a family thing. For them, it is a way to spend a day with their loved ones, just like going to a mall or theatre on a weekend. It is an activity that they can all do together, says Zia. The trend is catching up in the country too. Sailing away from the chaos of the cities and enjoying a quiet day with your loved ones is in vogue. Boating is essentially about going out with friends and family. Though it's a niche concept and the market is new and small, more and more people are enjoying their boats and sometimes especially the speed thrills that are associated with the activity, adds Anju. It is indeed a sport, which, because of its versatility, is enjoyed by both men and women alike. In fact, says Zia, it is the women who are promoting this sport by organizing birthdays, parties and surprises for their loved ones and themselves on sailboats and yachts. Most of the queries for celebrations on the boats come to us by women, she adds. And as far as the future of the sport is concerned Shakeel is optimistic and says, 'We will see women cruising long distances, including sailing at night in future. In fact, very soon one would see international level racing happening in our country.

Queen of the sea

When national level yachting champion Shibani Sachdeva wanted to learn sailing in 1986, there weren't too many clubs and facilities for learning the sport. I wanted to learn how to sail, but it was quite expensive then to enroll for a sailing program.' Shibani, national champion in 1997 and 2000, feels that it is the passion for sailing and the skill to maneuver the boat that is behind her success in the sport. She has taken her team to sail in international waters and feels that India needs to boost its infrastructure to be able to compete with other countries.

Here are a few additional facts about the Sea Scouts you may not know:

- Sea Scouts is part of the Boy Scouts of America. It is considered a "Venturing" organization, that is it is coed and caters to older youth, aged 14 to 21.
- The focus of Sea Scouts is for the youth to experience a water-based program, with particular emphasis on safety at sea, to learn good seamanship skills and to have a lot of fun doing it.
- Our Ship, #1909, is sponsored by East Greenwich Yacht Club.
- Our motto is "We do everything water" and we aim to live up to that claim.
- We currently have 12 active youth, 8 boys and 4 girls, aged 14 to 19, and we are actually one of the largest venturing groups in the state.
- We meet on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month, times depend on the time of year (right now we are 6-9 as we want to maximize daylight for time on the water.
- We have 2 sailboats (a Pearson 26 & a C&C 24) that we are cruising right now.
- Our goal for this year is to have every one of our youth (and adult leaders and any parents who are interested) pass and obtain the RI Safe Boater License.
- We strive to have at least 1 weekend activity each month. Please call Tom Stocker for a copy of this calendar or visit our Facebook page at "Sea Scouts Ship 1909".
- We welcome parents to join as well, either as youth leaders "Mates" or as committee members. For those who are not interested in being that active, we do ask that one parent of each youth to volunteer to attend at least one weekend event during the year.
- Dave Pickering is our Skipper, and Tom Stocker is the Chairman of the committee. We currently have 6 active adults and are actively looking for more (none of us have a son or daughter in the program). All of us are all knowledgeable and seasoned boaters.

Signing up is easy.
