Racing Committee

This past July is the middle month of our 3 month long summer season and included our new Around The Bay Race and the Whaler's Cruise/Race to Block Island. Earlier in the month most WBYC boats participated in EGYC's Annual Regatta.

The Monday Evening Summer Series has had great weather this past month with a variety of wind strengths and directions which resulted in no one boat dominating the spinnaker class. With four races left to complete and after 3 throw-outs *All In, Velocity*, and *Civil Action* are separated by 2 points in the battle for first place. *Stormin' Norman* and *Mojo* are tied in fourth with 14 points only 3 points out of third place. In the non-spinnaker class *Pale Rider* leads *Thora* by a single point for first place (6 and 7 points respectively) while

Climax has a stranglehold on third with 11 points, 5 points ahead of *Frequent Flyer*.

Though the turn out for our new Around The Bay Race was not what we had hoped for there were signs that the race has potential an some support from elsewhere on the bay. A "racing machine" named *Bella* came up from Sail Newport to sail the Around The Bay Course and with stellar weather completed the 32 nm course in a little over 4 1/2 hours. Fred Kerzner returned to WBYC racing in a slightly larger boat than he previously raced (*Journey* is 17 feet longer than *Swoose*) and sailed away from the non-spinnaker class of on the Around The Island Course finishing more than 17 minutes ahead of *Estesea* on corrected time. Check out the photos from this event on the website.

The Whaler's Cruise/Race to Block Island featured the same fresh breeze that we had for the Around The Bay Race the previous week and seven WBYC boats participated. The race was on the wind for its entire distance which favored the more race oriented boats but, despite the fresh breeze, being hard on the wind and mostly against the current left no boat able to finish within the time limit. *Mojo* led the fleet finishing at 17:00:30 with *B'causican* 19 minutes behind them and *Estesea* another 8 minutes later. Our table at Aldo's ran the length of their outside porch under the deck and they did a great job of serving everyone. Photos from this event will be up on the website soon (maybe before you receive this).

Coming up in August we have the Norton Memorial Regatta and the Lady Skippers Regatta.

Sailing in Newport: Nearly 1,000 gather for regatta

Sail Newport gathered 923 sailors last weekend for the annual Newport Regatta/Bacardi Newport Sailing Week.

A total of 148 races were run over the three-day event for 260 boats.

The Newport Regatta was started 29 years ago by Sail Newport as a Shields-only event and since then has grown to become one of the largest One-Design multi-class regattas on the East Coast.

The spectacular scene of 21 classes of boats throughout the East Passage and Rhode Island Sound stretched from north to south on five areas of racing. Classes of boats included 2.4 Metre, 12 Metre, 49er, 505, A Cats, Byte CII, Etchells, Farr 30, F-18, J/22, J/24, J/70, Laser, Laser Radial, S Class, Star, Sunfish, Swan 42, Vanguard 15, Viper 640 and VX One.

The regatta started on Friday with racing for three classes including Stars, Vipers and 505s. The brisk northeasterly breeze combined with an outgoing tide presented the racers with challenging conditions on their Potter Cover racing area. For the 505 class, the regatta served as its East Coast Championship. At the end of the event, Michael Komar of Newport was the

top racing sailor in the 505 Class with a fourth-place finish overall.

On Saturday, the conditions were light but choppy with a east/northeast breeze. However, local sailors and J/24 co-helmsmen John Mollicone of Newport and Tim Healy of Jamestown and their crew started what was to be a domination of the entire weekend with all first-place finishes for their third consecutive year of winning the Newport Regatta/Bacardi Newport Sailing Week and the District II J/24 Championship.

"Saturday was tricky," Mollicone said. "We had a long course because we were sailing with the Swan 42s, Farr 30s and J/70s. We like long courses, but there were lots of holes."

Mollicone and Healy have a collection of championship titles between them. Together with crew members Gordon Borgess, San Rabin and Geoff Becker, they kept the boat moving fast, making no tactical or boat-handling errors.

Mollicone said the strong starts and consistently fast boat speeds were the result of a cohesive team that has been together for many years.

"We have so much time together on the boat, it's second nature to us," Mollicone said.

On Sunday, conditions improved further, in spite of a dismal sailing forecast and short postponement ashore, to a steady 10 knots, which eventually filled in with a 15-knot seabreeze.

As the top-performing boat in the entire regatta, Team Helly Hansen also won the Dr. Robin Wallace Trophy. Mollicone had won the trophy in two previous years as well. The team also because qualified for the U.S. Adult Sailing Championship for the Clifford D. Mallory Trophy.

In the Farr 30 Class, Newport sailor Jim Richardson and his team on Barking Mad won the regatta and captured the North American Championship. This is the second North American trophy for Richardson, who also won in 2010.

With only five points behind Richardson, and two points from second place, Pieter Taselaar of Newport finished third.

Both Richardson and Taselaar will compete in the Farr 30 World Championship this week in Newport. Sail Newport will host and manage the regatta, scheduled to begin on Wednesday and continue through Saturday.

Local sailor Phip Hallowell collected silver on Sunday after winning the VX One New England Championship at the Newport Regatta. Hallowell sailed fast on the two days of racing, but firmly snatched the title by posting wins in the last two races on Sunday.

Joining other Newport sailors, Phil and Wendy Lotz with a third crew on their Viper won the largest class of boats in their Viper 640. Two subdivisions of Vipers sailed in the regatta — a group of boats that sailed three days, such as the Lotzes', and another subdivision comprised of boats that sailed only Saturday and Sunday. The collection of scores from the two-day division determined the Atlantic Coast Championship.

The Lotzes won the first race in the largest fleet of 28 boats and went on to win a total of five more races. A second-place and third-place finish put the Lotzes at the top of the three-day event with the Newport Regatta trophy locked in.

"It was a competitive field," Phil Lotz said. Although in a comfortable lead on Saturday, "we ended up on the wrong end of the line. The team made sure to then cover their closest competitor to keep a hold on the lead."

"It was the right thing to have done," he said. "We were very happy to have won the three-day series."

Other top local sailors won class trophies, including Gunther Buerman who drove the majestic 12 Metre KZ3/New Zealand to win three of four races, earning him the Grand Prix Classes' first-place trophy. Also, Newport's Ben Quatromoni won six of 11 races to win the Vanguard 15 honors and Walter Bopp of Jamestown steered his S Class Mischief to a first-place win.

Jeff Siegal of Newport, who recently won an Etchells regatta in Newport two weeks ago, finished second overall as the top local sailor in that fleet. Also, two local sailors finished third as top Newport sailors in their classes, including Paul Zabetakis on his Swan 42 Impeturous. In addition, Lynne Shore, a Olympic gold medalist sailor, finished third in the Laser Class.

Sail Newport Executive Director Brad Read said that the sailors traveled to Newport from 17 U.S. states and five countries, including Canada, England, Germany and New Zealand.

Local youth best in nation

"No one else could catch him," Sail Newport/Brenton Cove Racing Team Opti Coach Joakim Karlsen said of Luke Ingalls, who recently won the USODA National Optimist Championships. The 13-year-old Ingalls, who raced in his first regatta just two years ago in Sail Newport's Youth Challenge, dominated the fleet of 300 top-level youth sailors in the nation at the championship event on Lake St. Clair in Grosse Pointe, Mich.

"I was really excited because I have been working really hard," Ingalls said. "It was great to feel that two years had finally paid off."

The young sailor has trained at Sail Newport with Karlsen when few Newport sailors are on the water, putting in hours of training between February and May and September through November.

During the summer months, Ingalls sails with the Brenton Cove Racing Team (a partnership between Ida Lewis Yacht Club and Sail Newport) and also with a local team of sailors from FAST and the Sakonnet Yacht Club.

"Luke definitely has a lot of natural talent," Karlsen said, "but his performance ability comes from the extraordinary amount of hours he practices.

"He is extremely focused on the details and is so fast he can get out of virtually any situation out there," he added.

A total of 13 sailors from Newport attended the event. Other local sailors on the Brenton Cove team who finished in the top 50 in the nation included Justin Callahan (13th), Tommy Whittemore (19th), Kevin Gallagher (25th), Joseph Gallagher (35th) and Oscar MacGillivray (39th). Nearly all of the young Narragansett Bay sailors qualified for the US Team Trails in the Spring of 2014. That event is for the selection of the top Optimist sailors who will represent the U.S.A at events around the world.
